East Wight Workshop Nears Completion

Work on the electrical installation has now been completed. The next phase of the work involves painting the floor, walls and roof and fitting out work benches, shelving, cupboards and a secure access storage area for controlled parts.

Although the refurbishment work has taken longer than expected it is essential that the workshop is set up properly to enable restoration of airframe components to proceed in a controlled and efficient manner.

VCN Parts Cataloguing and Condition Survey Work in Progress

Apart from the main airframe components now secure in the East Wight workshop, a large quantity of other parts have been temporarily stored elsewhere on the Island. BNAPS Trustee Guy Palmer is leading the activity to log in, identify and assess the condition of all G-AVCN components. This activity will continue in parallel with work on the main airframe components.

From the parts inventory a "wants list" will be generated for those parts that are not suitable for re-use and the need to obtain replacement for missing items. Priority items will be identified as determined from the top level restoration planning schedule.

BNAPS Joins the British Aviation Preservation Council (BAPC)

On 21 May 2011 BNAPS was invited to be represented at a meeting of the BAPC held at the East Midlands Aeropark regarding application for BAPC membership. BNAPS Trust Chairman Peter Graham was invited to give a presentation to the audience about BNAPS and its aims and objectives assisted by BNAPS Trustee Bob Wealthy. Also representing BNAPS was John Kenyon who was on hand to advise BNAPS on BAPC matters from his long association with the organization. In 1967 John had proposed formation of an organisation called the British Aircraft Preservation Council BAPC and subsequently became its Chair. This was done whilst John was chair and founder member of the Northern Aircraft Preservation Society [latterly the Aeroplane Collection Ltd]. Subsequently the BAPC took on a wider brief and became the British Aviation Preservation Council.

Having given the BNAPS presentation the proposal that BNAPS should be accepted into the BAPC was put to the vote and received unanimous approval.

For more information see the BAPC website: http://www.bapc.org.uk/html/members_alpha.html BNAPS' BAPC membership will give access to advice and assistance from other BAPC members and if needed financial assistance in the form of short term interest free loans that may be granted by the BAPC for specific purposes associated with aircraft restoration and associated activities.

Peter Graham was fortunate to meet Dr Robert Fleming of the Vulcan to the Sky Trust who offered to come down to the Island and give us the benefit of his experience of returning Vulcan XH558 to flying condition that may be of some help in addressing the "Fly or No Fly" issues associated with BNAPS restoration policy for Islander VCN.

Prior to the meeting the attendees had met up at the East Midlands Aeropark where amongst the aircraft on show was the Britten Sheriff G-FRJB that was in the final stages of a complete static restoration. The Sheriff was the last aircraft design by John Britten before he died in July 1977. G-FRJB was substantially complete when the Sheriff Aerospace Company, based at Sandown Airport run by John Britten's brother, Robin Britten, hit financial difficulties in 1984 and ceased operations. The abandoned Sheriff, less engines, remained in open storage at Sandown for 2 or 3 years until it was acquired by the East Midlands Aeropark as part of its growing aircraft collection.

Solent Sky Aviation Museum Hosts BN-1F First Flight 60th Anniversary

The 60th anniversary of the official first flight of the BN-1F was celebrated on 26 May 2011. The event was organised jointly by BNAPS and the Solent Sky Aviation Museum at Southampton.

Peter Gatrell, the man who originally built most of the BN-1F as the first person employed by John Britten and Desmond Norman, was guest of honour accompanied by Peter's wife Brenda and family members. After the welcoming address by Alan Jones, Solent Sky Museum's Director, Peter was presented with a certificate granting honorary life membership of BNAPS by Peter Graham, chairman of the BNAPS board of trustees, in recognition of his work on the BN-1F aircraft and his outstanding contribution to the B-N Islander G-AVCN restoration project.
